break into groups to explore what the Principles mean for our research choices and practices in the context of an assigned case. We have done our best to create groups that share some common contextual connections so that you have some additional grounding from which your conversations can draw.

By the end of this workshop, you will be able to:

- Extrapolate from a hypothetical application of the CCGHR Principles for GHR to case studies that reflect different phases of the research process.
- Grapple with and verbalize tensions that arise from the consideration of the CCGHR Principles for GHR as a whole in the context of an ethically or morally challenging case.

Description: Open Space Technology ("Open Spaces") is a process meant to encourage participants of events to suggest, recommend or lead break-out sessions that are based on the theme of the event, but have minimal to no preparation or planning. The intention is to foster organic discussions on the event theme and

facilitate connections between facilitators, participants and their ideas, as people are stimulated and influenced by related talks, workshops or speakers.

A large scale version of the schedule will be posted where all participants have access to it, and the times for Open Spaces will be left blank. Post-it style notes and pens will be made available at the schedule. Throughout the event, participants who have ideas for a topic will be encouraged to post their name and a title for their proposed session. The title should be descriptive enough so that other participants will understand the theme, and can decide to join or not.

Participants who create Open Space topics are responsible for taking notes on the discussion, and can serve as moderator for their group's discussion or allow someone else to do so. A moderator is not necessary though – the intention is to encourage as much equitable discussion and knowledge sharing as possible, however the group feels most comfortable doing so. Notes from each Open Space session should be shared within the group's participants after the discussion is concluded. As well, a copy from each group will be collected by the OCI facilitators for records of the event.

Public Lecture: Global Health Research in Canada and Beyond, BSIA room 1-42

Presenter: Steven Hoffman

Description: Health inequities are often avoidable consequences of actions and contexts that disproportionately advantage some groups over others. These negatively affect human rights, including the right to health. Global health research (GHR) aims to promote greater equity worldwide. The recently developed Principles of GHR are meant to encourage both established and "new" researchers in global health to adopt more ethical and equitable forms of global health research.

Dr. Steven Hoffman, the Scientific Director of the CIHR Institute of Population and Public Health will be speaking on the importance of the growth and enrichment of global health research within Canada, and extending beyond its borders to the global community. From his unique and knowledgeable perspective, Dr. Hoffman will discuss the significant impact and influence of GHR in the context of current health threats and inequalities, both in Canada and internationally. Directed to "new" global health researchers, Dr. Hoffman will also be sharing some of his own journey along his career path and providing advice for those interested in studying global health issues. His presentation will include a lecture, followed by questions and open discussion.

At the same time, there is recognition of the tensions that may exist for these individuals in following these principles as they work to establish a career in global health. With this in mind, this proposed panel will draw on the expertise of global health faculty and practitioners at different career stages to explore the opportunities and tensions related to building a career within global health. In particular, panel participants will discuss how they operationalize the CCGHR principles for global health research in their own work while meeting other external demands necessary to maintain and build their career (e.g. peer-reviewed publications, applying for funding and adhering to funding requirements, working with multiple partners across sectors, etc.).

Description: This workshop provides an overview of the different stages of conducting a systematic review and how this methodology complements other types of review studies performed in global health research. Learn the gold standards that are recommended for systematic search methods and receive practical tips and tools for developing comprehensive search strategies. By the end of the workshop, you should:

- Be able to distinguish between the purpose and methodologies of various review studies including systematic reviews, scoping reviews, realist reviews and narrative/literature reviews
- Be knowledgeable of the steps involved in conducting a systematic review
- Understand the composition of systematic search methods and have gained practical skills in systematic search techniques
- Be familiar with supplemental resources and help materials for conducting and reporting a systematic review

- Critically examine how their values and norms are affirmed, stretched, and/or challenged by the principles.
- Develop a deeper understanding of what equity-informed choices they face through their involvement in global health research.
- Visualize themselves using and talking about the CCGHR Principles with others involved in the current context.
- Plan a next step that enables equity-informed decision-making in the current context.

Directions and Parking

<u>Event location</u>: The OCI 2016 takes place at the Balsillie School of International Affairs (BSIA) located at 67 Erb St. W., Waterloo, Ontario. Each day will start in the Multipurpose room, 1-42. Please enter through the front doors of the building, and turn right. Follow the hallway and turn left past the courtyard. Room 1-42 will be on your right, just past the washrooms.

Please note that there is some construction outside of BSIA that may cause some delays in travel time, or parking.

<u>Event Parking</u>: The lot in behind the BSIA building is no longer available for parking.

Lot **M** (see attached map) called the **Museum Lot** is directly across the street from BSIA, at the train station, and can be accessed from Father David Bauer Drive.
